'BENCHMARKS AND FORECASTS ON GREY LITERATURE'

2 July 2009, 10:30–16:30 Hours**

Over the past 15 years, Grey Literature has developed from a millennium movement to a well defined field in information studies. The needs and demands of information society are in constant state of change and flux. To a great extent, grey literature is the cause of this. Grey Literature has grown exponentially in relation to commercially published literature and now challenges informational professionals in all sectors of government, academics, business and industry.

This workshop was first conducted by Dominic Farace at the Library of Congress in May 2009, where it met with top reviews from among the participants. Farace is Instructor in Grey Literature at the University of New Orleans, Distance Education Program; Guest Lecturer at the University of Amsterdam, Media Studies; Editor of The Grey Journal, which won the Victorine van Schaick Prize 2008; and Director of GreyNet, Grey Literature Network Service.

GreyWorks 2009 consists of Four Modules:

An Introduction to Grey Literature

Background, Definition, Document Types, Collections, Standardization, Classification, etc.

The Demand-side of Grey Literature

Use, Usage, Users, Access, Search and Retrieval, Repositories, Preservation, Assessment, Citations, etc.

The Supply-side of Grey Literature

Production, Publishing, Authors, Researchers, Metadata, Ownership, Copyright, Review Process, etc.

The Future of Grey Literature

Policy Development, Value Chain, Business Models, Networking, Education, Training, etc.

Each module is a mix of formal presentation, exercises, and informal discussion. During the afternoon wrap-up, the participants will develop a consensus document expressing the state of the art on grey literature.

The British Library 1978-2009 Forerunner in Grey Literature

In December 1978, the British Library hosted the York Seminar. This event led to the establishment of EAGLE, the European Association for Grey Literature Exploitation and its SIGLE-database. Through the years, The British Library contributed 40% of SIGLE's more than 800,000 records. Thirty years on, it will not go unnoticed that The British Library is represented on the GL11 Program Committee and that BL is one of the start sponsors to this international S&T event. Neither will it go unnoticed that The British Library has taken on Associate Membership in GreyNet and as such is counted among the Corporate Authors to its serial and non-serial publications on grey literature. GreyNet publications from 1994-2000 are still available thru interlibrary loan/document delivery via the British Library Document Supply Centre (BLDSC) in Boston Spa, United Kingdom. These include the Proceedings of the first four international conferences in the GL-series (ISSN 1386-2316), as well as the 4th edition of the Annotated Bibliography on the Topic of Grey Literature (ISBN 90-74854-26-5). Together these five information resources contain the full text of some 120 conference papers and more than 750 bibliographic records most of which are annotated.
